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USDA PUBLISHES STANDARDS FOR GRADES OF CULTIVATED GINSENG

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18, 2006 -- The U.S. Department of Agriculture is establishing voluntary U.S. Standards for Grades of Cultivated Ginseng.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service created the standards at the request of industry and published a previous notice in the *Federal Register* requesting comments on the proposed Standards for Grades of Cultivated Ginseng. The new standards, which become effective Jan. 18, 2007, will provide a common language for trade facilitation.

The Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 directs and authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture "to develop and improve standards of quality, condition, quantity, grade and packaging and recommend and demonstrate such standards in order to encourage uniformity and consistency in commercial practices."

AMS works with industry representatives and others to establish or revise U.S. standards for nearly 240 agricultural products. Industry uses the standards in the marketplace to specify acceptable quality and/or condition of commodities.
