The shuttle runs approximately every 15 minutes from the airport. The discounted rate for one way is \$16, round trip \$28. The most economical rate is \$28. When making your reservation, you will need to use group code UDZ4G to get the discounted rate. Additional discounts may be available if five or more people are on the same reservation.

Reservations are not required when you arrive, but are encouraged. Advance reservations help the service plan the number of vans needed to service customers efficiently. You will need to make reservations for your return trip to the airport, preferably two days ahead of departure.

The Super Shuttle customer service counter is located in the airport baggage claim area.

**Taxi Service** – To schedule a taxi, call 919-840-7277. Reservations and on-demand service are available. Transportation from the airport to downtown Raleigh will cost approximately \$30. The Terminal 1 taxi dispatch booth is located on the curb near Southwest Airlines. The Terminal 2 dispatch booth is located on the curb on the terminal's lower level.

#### From I-40 (east or west) and from Raleigh-Durham Airport

Take Exit 298-B (South Saunders Street). South Saunders Street becomes McDowell Street. Stay on McDowell and take a right onto Davie Street. Take right onto Salisbury Street. The Sheraton is ½ block on the left. \*To enter parking deck from hotel, take a right onto Cabarrus Street (from Salisbury) then take immediate right onto Gale Street. Sheraton Parking Deck entrance is second on the right, vertical blue sign with white letters, PARK.

#### From I-95 South (Headed north into Raleigh)

I-95 Junctions with I-40 in Benson, NC. Take I-40 west into Raleigh to Exit 298-B (South Saunders Street). South Saunders Street becomes McDowell Street. Stay on McDowell and take a right onto Davie Street. Take right onto Salisbury Street. The Sheraton is ½ block on the left. \*To enter parking deck from hotel, take a right onto Cabarrus Street (from Salisbury) then take immediate right onto Gale Street. Sheraton Parking Deck entrance is second on the right, vertical blue sign with white letters, PARK.

#### From I-95 (Headed south into Raleigh)

I-95 Junctions with both Route 1 and Route 64. Route 1 junctions north of Rocky Mount. Take Route 1 south to I-40 west. Take Exit 298-B (South Saunders Street). South Saunders Street becomes McDowell Street. Stay on McDowell and take a right onto Davie Street. Take right onto Salisbury Street. The Sheraton is ½ block on the left. \*To enter parking deck from hotel, take a right onto Cabarrus Street (from Salisbury) then take immediate right onto Gale Street. Sheraton Parking Deck entrance is second on the right, vertical blue sign with white letters, PARK.

Route 64 junctions in Rocky Mount. Follow 64 west to I-40 west. Take Exit 298-B (South Saunders Street). South Saunders Street becomes McDowell Street. Stay on McDowell and take a right onto Davie Street. Take right onto Salisbury Street. The Sheraton is ½ block on the left. \*To enter parking deck from hotel, take a right onto Cabarrus Street (from Salisbury) then take immediate right onto Gale Street. ### **Conference Details and Activities**

When you arrive on Thursday, please remember to check in at the registration desk located in the Esplanade to receive your registration packet. Registration will be open from 4:00-9:00 pm on Thursday evening. The registration desk will also be open Friday and Saturday morning for late arrivals. After receiving your registration bags, be sure and check out the contents. There will be helpful information regarding places to eat, maps, discounts, etc.

On Thursday evening, please join us for a Welcome Reception. The reception will be located in The Gallery from 7:00 – 9:00 pm. Enjoy delicious appetizers and drinks while you network with other colleagues.

The Livestock and Grain Branch will depart the hotel on Thursday morning and travel to Carolina Stockyards in Siler City for a livestock correlation. The correlation will consist of discussion on USDA grade standards and how those standards apply to individual animals. They will be grading feeder cattle, slaughter steers and heifers, cull slaughter cows, replacement cows and goats. After lunch, the group will travel to the Food Science Lab at NC State University for a meat cuts demonstration presented by Steve Olson, meat specialist with the USDA, AMS, Standardization Branch.



Commodity breakout sessions will begin on Friday morning. The Branch Chiefs and their staff have put together informative programs to help you expand your knowledge and enhance your market reporting skills. The Cotton Branch and the Fruit and Vegetable Branch will travel off-site for a portion of their session. Off-site activities for the Fruit and Vegetable Branch include a trip to the State Farmers Market for a product correlation and a portral training workshop at the NC Department of Agriculture building. The Cotton Branch will be visiting Carolina Cotton Growers Cooperative.

On Friday evening, members and guests will gather for a pig pickin' at the Martin Building located at the NC State Fairgrounds. Dinner will include slow-cooked pig, chicken, traditional sides such as cole slaw, baked beans and hushpuppies. Oh, and let's not forget the sweet ice tea!



The Segway is powered by two lithium-ion batteries. It runs quietly and is emissions-free. \*\*Space is limited for the Segway tour. You must pre-register in order to participate. Early registrations will be given priority. To participate in the Segway tour, you must be at least 16 years old and weigh between 100 and 260 pounds.\*\*

You will get a chance to visit the NC Museum of Natural Sciences. The museum is the 3<sup>rd</sup> most visited attraction in North Carolina. "Chocolate", an exciting new exhibition, will be opening at the North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences.
